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Well done to our new School Leaders, I look forward to working with you to achieve great things for our school. Yesterday I worked with the SRC Coordinator for 2013, Mr Jeremy Whiterod, Mrs Lucy Burns and the District SRC Coordinator Mrs Pam Sharkey.

With the Student Leaders we developed the Student Action Team portfolios which will include School Culture, Student Well Being, The Environment and Community Engagement. Teams are based on the principles:

- That students can make serious and important decisions about issues that are important to them.
- That students can do important and valuable things: that they have skills expertise and a knowledge of the needs of their community.
- That important action can be undertaken as part of students' learning in school: community focused research and action is an appropriate educational approach.

Through the Student Action Teams it is intended that students are empowered with a voice that allows them to make a difference within their school and community.

Congratulations to Year 10 students James Peters, Marcus Dargan and Corey Hando who have reached the short list for school based apprenticeships with Parkes Shire Council. This is a real credit to each of the boys and their presentation in the competitive application process. We wish you every success in the interviews.

Last Thursday as part of our strengthening partnership with the CSU Future Moves Program an information session and morning tea was held. It was great to have some parents and grandparents join us. I think our scones are gaining a popular following. The main purpose of the visit was to work with Kindergarten who created their invitations to their "Graduation". They then completed their graduation hats which they will wear at our Presentation Ceremony on 18 December when they graduate from Kindergarten. Future Moves aims to build aspiration for tertiary study amongst school students in rural, remote and regional NSW. By introducing Kindergarten to the world of university we hope the program will encourage students to be engaged in school studies and become more confident in considering tertiary study as a realistic option within their career path. Next year Future Moves will be timetabled from Kindergarten to Year 8, under the coordination of Mrs Rachel Cody. Students' perceptions and self-concept are formed well before high school. Future Moves is designed to shift and influence students' mindset by providing them with opportunity, experiences and knowledge.





Year 9 students have been working with Mr Trevor Robinson, Ms Irene Ridgeway and Ms Jessica Williams in the research, design and construction of the Indigenous Garden near the Derribong entry to school. The opening of the garden will be on 19 December at 10.30 a.m and all community members are most welcome to come along and share what the students have achieved. 

Side By Side School News Feedback to principals gives power to students

Students in Dubbo, Peak Hill, Narromine and surrounding communities have shown they can teach their school leaders a thing or two.

The students have been advising principals and classroom teachers on developing quality lessons and how to get students more involved at school.

The Dubbo School Education Group Feedback Project, which started earlier this year, recognises students are key stakeholders in education and there are significant benefits in increasing students' input into educational decision-making.

Peak Hill Central School Year 10 student Georgia Westcott said students wanted to be more involved in the decisions that affected what and how they learned and the opportunities a school provided.

"As students we can let teachers and principals know what types of lessons we learn most from and how we want to be involved in school and the community," Georgia said.

"So we have been running workshops with principals and developed activities for teachers to think about our point of view when they are developing lessons or programs at school."

Secondary students from Dubbo College South Campus, Narromine High School and Peak Hill Central School led a workshop with principals, teachers and consultants at the Western NSW Region Leadership Forum.

The workshop activities included ideas for soliciting

feedback from students on quality teaching, brainstorming opportunities for greater student involvement in course structures and school planning and ideas for developing learning activities with real-world connections.

Dubbo school education director Ann-Marie Furney said students should be considered and involved in decision-making so educators could develop relevant and engaging lessons as well as give students the opportunities to confidently take part in their community.

"Students have valuable contributions to make," Ms Furney said. "We need to listen to their opinions on what is quality teaching and their ideas for meaningful learning.

"The resources that students have developed and presented to principals have been professional and very well received.

"They have given principals the tools to explore in their own school what students expect of teachers and how to encourage teachers to involve students more in school planning and programs."

The principals of schools in the Dubbo School Education Group were committed to increasing opportunities for students to be involved at education group and regional level, she said.

They had agreed to continue to include the student-led sessions at regular planning meetings and involving the student body in on-going school planning.
