NAPLAN

On Thursday 5 September ACARA identified an error in the placement of the national average markers on the Years 5 and 7 NAPLAN Student Reports for Language Conventions. Importantly the NAPLAN student data is correct. ACARA made the immediate decision to halt any further packaging and distribution of NAPLAN reports while options regarding the distribution of correct NAPLAN Student Reports were considered. ACARA is working closely with Test Administration Authorities (TAAs) in every state and territory to ensure correct reports are distributed. This matter may result in the delay of the distribution of student reports, possibly to the week of 13 October, however ACARA and TAAs will seek to minimise the delay.


Stage 2

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Drama Spotlight

This term Stage 2 Drama have been exploring the way that authors put forward different characters' points of view. They have been learning that there is always more than one side to the story.

Early in their study of this unit of work, students had to take on the role of detectives to uncover who a series of mysterious items belonged to. These included a photo of a beloved cow, a jar with some beans, an advertisement for the markets and a foreclosure document. Students put forward some interesting character profiles and correctly identified the owner as Jack from Jack and the Beanstalk.

They then took on the role of the townspeople who had received a letter from the Giant. In this letter, the Giant was seeking assistance from the townspeople to help find the boy who stole his possessions. Students discovered that Jack was not necessarily a good guy!

The next week students had a visit from the Giant's wife, Thelma. They learnt that the Giant wasn't a fierce ogre as they were lead to believe and agreed that the townspeople should in fact help to find Jack and bring him to justice.

Finally, students got to meet Jack (played by three of the students) and were able to ask him questions about his 'crimes'. We then spent some time talking about the consequences of Jack's actions and better choices that Jack could have made along the way. Students role-played these ideas, and we all agreed that Jack and the Giant could have reached a compromise. The concluding activities will see students retelling the story from the point of view of the hen. From here they will explore a fairy tale of their choosing and tell it from the point of view of one of the other characters.

Check It Out Day

On Tuesday 3 September, Stage 3 with Mrs Cody, Mr Ruddell and Mr Wade) went on an excursion to Charles Sturt University in Orange to learn about things we could do at University. We had to be at school at 7:20am, but we didn't mind it. After nearly two hours on the bus (kindly driven by Mr Wade) we arrived and were greeted by Tonia who showed us where to go. She took us into a room to get our bags, pens and drink bottles, and then we were given some cookies and poppers for Morning Tea.

We were split into different groups (based on the colour of our bags) and had to introduce ourselves and the type of food we liked. Some people said "cake" and "strawberries" and many more. Then we headed off to our first activity. We did things like Science, Nursing, Botany and PE.

My group went to Nursing where we had to wash our hands thoroughly. We then had to check them under a UV light to see if there was any cream left. This showed us where the germs were! After cleaning our hands we went into the ward which had anatomical mannequins. We had to pull out all of the body parts and then work out how to put them back together again. While my group was putting the body back together, I worked on figuring out how to reassemble the brain. After this, we checked pulses on the dummies that were in bed.

In Science, I learned how to extract DNA from strawberries. First we put three strawberries and a little bit of tap water in a sealable bag. Then we had to squish the strawberries and water up until there were no lumps left in it. We poured the strawberry mix into a funnel and it slowly dripped into a test tube. We then poured some rubbing alcohol into the test tube and started to see the DNA of the strawberries.

After every group had finished their first lot of activities we had lunch (hamburgers and chips). After lunch we went on a hunt around the university where we had to answer questions and create a poem. We all came back together and showed everyone the poems we wrote.

To finish the day, we all got to dress in graduation gowns and were presented with a certificate. We all graduated from the Check It Out Day.


