Stage 1



Drama Spotlight



This term, Stage 2 Drama has explored our precious resource- water. They have looked at the importance of water and how we use it. Students were given a water fact (information from the United Nations) about the scarcity of water in some other countries and created short improvisations around the factual information provided. This then led into a discussion about our water usage in Australia compared to the significant difference in developing countries who on average only use 10 litres of water each day, the same amount we can use in a single toilet flush or short shower!



Students also explored alternatives to using water and created short improvisations. While these improvisations were quite funny and impractical (such as having a shower with lemonade), students realised just how essential water was for human survival. On average, a human being can survive up to one month without food, whereas they can only last about 7 days without water. They also learnt that every 20 seconds somebody in the world will have died because of a lack of clean water or sanitation.

Having discovered how important and precious water actually is, students created scenes about conserving water around the home. This will lead students into learning about the conventions of scriptwriting as they work towards writing their own script to be performed to a Kindergarten and Stage 1 audience.

HSC Industrial Technology Major Projects

Throughout the past 12 months our HSC Industrial Technology students have been busily working away at producing their Major Work Projects and Folios. The students were Georgia Westcott, Chad Hartin, Corey Hando, Elliott Learmonth and Bondi Fitzpatrick. Georgia has produced a Kitchen Island Bench using Merbau and recycled oregon timber, including innovative push button hidden drawers, soft-close drawers, soft-close doors and an inlayed granite cutting stone. Chad has produced an Entertainment Unit using Meranti timber with a Jarrah stain, including hidden push button DVD drawers, soft-close drawers and soft-close doors with in-build glass panels. Corey has produced an Aussie Bar using Meranti timber with a Maple stain, including a Mini Orb front, soft-close drawers and doors. Elliott has produced a Queen Size bed made from Meranti timber with a Walnut stain, including an in-built mirror in the bedhead and a hidden push button drawer in the bed end. Bondi has produced a split level Bar and Hutch using Radiata Pine with a Jarrah stain, including cavities for storage for a bar fridge and bar accessories.

All students have invested many tireless hours into the completion of these projects and should take pride in the high quality projects that they have produced. This once again showcases the amazing power and strength of our Peak Hill Central School students.

Careers Corner

As Term 3 is nearing an end I would like to once again remind year 12 students to be dedicated to their study and make the most of their last few weeks of formal schooling before the examinations commence.

We will be holding an information session from Noth Parkes Mines on Monday the 8th September about apprenticeships and scholarships for Indigenous and non Indigenous students. I would like to recommend that parents and students begin to engage in discussion about career and study pathways. If students are finding any difficulties with study and making career decisions I urge them to come and meet with myself, Crystal Williams and Carmen Sharah who form the transition team to have a chat and investigate the vast amount of options they have.

Study Tip of the week: Preparing to Study

Find a good place to study. This means a desk with nothing on it except what you need for the task you are going to work on. Move everything out of the way. You want to concentrate on one thing: STUDYING. Have a regular time and place for studying.

Make sure you have the following:

- Solid flat surface you can write on. Clear everything off your desk except what you are working on
- Good lighting Not too bright, not too dim
- Chair A regular chair that is comfortable. Avoid strain and fatigue
- Books Have all necessary text books and reference books
- Supplies Pens, ruler, calculator, etc...
- Clock Helps you manage time, or timing yourself doing past papers
- Eliminate all distractions Classical music played softly may help
- Computer If needed

What's it like to be an Architect?

Architects use creativity and a practical understanding of structures and materials to develop concepts, plans, specifications and detailed drawings for buildings and other structures. They negotiate with builders and planning authorities, administer building contracts and inspect work that has been carried out. Architects may also be involved in project feasibility studies, strategic asset investigations, heritage studies, urban planning, interior design or landscape design.

How much can I expect to earn?

Full-time employed Architect earn an average of \$1352 per week.

Personal requirements

- enjoy design
- creativity
- able to analyse problems logically

good communication skills.

Architects may perform the following tasks:

- discuss requirements of clients or builders (to design a new structure or modify an existing one) and prepare a brief
- prepare sketches, production drawings and detailed drawings by hand or using computer-aided design (CAD) software
- combine structural, mechanical and artistic elements into the building design, such as decks and atriums, lifts, air conditioning systems and decorative finishes
- discuss designs and cost estimates with clients and others involved in the project, including engineers, quantity



- surveyors, landscape architects, and urban and regional planners
- obtain necessary approvals from authorities
- prepare specifications and contract documents for builders, tradespeople and legal advisers, specifying building materials, construction equipment and, in some cases, the interior furnishings
- observe, inspect and monitor building work to ensure it is progressing according to the contract and specifications
- evaluate projects once they are completed and occupied.

Specialisations

Architects often specialise in particular types of work, such as domestic, low-rise commercial, high-rise commercial, industrial, conservation and heritage buildings. Architects need to keep up with changing trends in the construction industry and the community. They have considerable contact with the public


Modern History
