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Drama Spotlight

Students in Kindergarten have begun their study of Puppetry, which will see them engage with and make a range of puppets. The unit began with students exploring how to manipulate their bodies to create shapes, and turning these shapes and movements into characters through voice and enactment.

Students were then provided with a range of objects from around the home, and had to use their performance skills to bring these objects to life. Objects included tongs, chopsticks, a can opener etc., and these were transformed into crocodiles, men on stilts, dolphins etc.

We then made a simple finger puppet in the shape of an elephant. Students coloured in their elephant and we workshopped it to the Dance with the Elephants song and presented it at the Week 8 Assembly. The photos included with this article show students exploring how to manipulate their puppets.

Following on from this, students made another finger puppet, this time using their index and middle fingers to form the legs. They practised how to manipulate it so that their puppet was sitting, standing, walking, running, kicking and jumping.

Next term, students will continue to explore a range of puppets including pipe cleaner puppets, talking egg-box puppets and hand puppets. If anyone is able to donate half-dozen egg cartons for the talking egg-box puppets, this would be greatly appreciated.

I would also like to take this opportunity to commend the Stage 1 Drama students who performed their native animal acrostic poems at the Commendation Assembly on Monday. Each week there will be a newsletter article promoting courses run across the Western Access Program. This program is highly successful in delivering a wider curriculum across our schools, maximising student choice and achievement.

HSC Chemistry – David Lynn - Trundle

HSC Chemistry students have been studying Forensic Chemistry, exploring how chemistry is used to solve crime through various analytical techniques, including electrophoresis, used in analysis of DNA. We performed an experiment to model electrophoresis, involving making a gel with copper electrodes embedded in it and 4 'wells' in the centre, into which we placed four different food colourings. The aim was to see them move through the gel due to their charge. In the photo it can be see that all the food colouring molecules had the same charge, negative, as they all moved towards the positive plate.

HSC Biology – Ms JK Jung - Trundle

Biology is one of the major disciplines of Science, which focuses on the study of living organisms. It has a substantial impact on our society because it is closely linked to the study of health and medicine as well as agriculture, biochemistry, ecology, genetics, microbiology
