#### SECONDARY STUDIES NEWS



#### **AUTISM AWARENESS**

In April each year we celebrate World Autism Month, beginning with the United Nations-sanctioned 15<sup>th</sup> annual World Autism Awareness Day on April 2. Here at PHCS, we want to dedicate this month to improving **acceptance** for autistic children and young people.

#### **Explaining Autism**

Simply put, "Every day, our brains interpret (understand) the things we see, smell, hear, taste, touch, and experience. But when someone's brain has trouble interpreting these things, it can make it hard to talk, listen, understand, play, and learn" (Walters 2016). So, a friend with autism is just as smart as other kids, but he or she may have a harder time making friends, following directions or dealing with change. He or she may be very sensitive to loud noises or certain textures or foods, but may really enjoy the way it feels to flap his or her hands or spin around. Autism is something some people are born with — it just means that the brain operates a little differently.

Whether you have autism, love someone who does, or are looking to support a diverse, accepting and kind community, you're invited to help create a world where all people with autism can reach their full potential.


A massive thank you must go to Matt Ellis from Cricket NSW for setting up and helping to run the day for us.

These people have been very generous in giving up their time and Samuel has noticed some themes emerging from his work. Two important themes are one, the importance of Country and being part of a family in Peak Hill. A second theme, is that all of the interviewees have a belief that the future lies in the hands of young people and it is up to the community to educate the young in Wiradjuri culture and beliefs.

One of my other students at another school is completing a beautiful mural for her school based on the Wiradjuri story of how the Southern Cross was formed. The students have done a wonderful job on getting permission from their interviewees to share their information, and I have very much appreciated the assistance of all the local community members who have contributed so generously to the students Major Projects. Thank you so very much, because I could not do my work without your support and guidance. I am very much open to any assistance in preparing for and teaching my very dedicated Indigenous students. We have all learned so much about ourselves and the challenges we face, especially in overcoming Intergenerational Trauma, a topic that comes up over and over again in our studies of not only Indigenous Australians but First Nations Peoples around the world. It is such a privilege for me to be working at Peak Hill and working with our students.

Dave explained that the bitter taste would take some time to get used to, but once you became familiar with it they became very sought after for their medicinal benefits.

Peak Hill Industries were keen to give the bus a tour of their shop and show them how their products are manufactured. The tour was very impressive with the goys getting to see a laser cutter, robot welder and robot bender. The boys were all engaged as Cameron explained all the processes that were involved in making their main product "sheep crushes" that are used for sheep crutching, needling and drenching. Cameron also told the boys that they employ local workers and they are looking for more staff to expand their growing company.

The boys then headed around to Dave's place to help him move his lawn. All the boys got involved and helped. They got a sense of satisfaction out of doing a good deed in the community.

The boys cooked a BBQ for lunch out at the Bogan Weir and enjoyed the afternoon fishing and swimming at the Weir and even managed to catch half a dozen Carp. Some of the boys were even brave enough to go off the rope swing.

I dropped the boys back at school at 3pm after another great day. They are a good group of kids who I look forward to having each Monday.
