Principal's Report

As 2023 draws to an end as a school it is time to reflect on our achievements this year and reset as we plan for the 2024 school year. PHCS is the major hub of the Peak Hill Community with close to two hundred people on the one site any given day.

At PHCS our focus is and always will be to Future Proof the Kids of Peak Hill. We have focused and assisted in adding value to every child, so they improve in Literacy, Numeracy and Reading.

We have systems in place to ensure Attendance is a key focus with our aim for all students at attend school at least 90% of the time. There is a strong correlation between attendance and student attainment.



We have proactive wellbeing structures in place to educate students in many areas of social development including friendships, cooperation, and resilience. This year in Term 4 we banned mobile phones in the school. This has resulted in greater engagement, better interactions between students in the playground and greater focus on student learning. This week we have engaged, "Youth Up Front", to work with our secondary students on some of those skills necessary for leading a healthy and fulfilling life. Positive Behaviours for Learning was expanded this year with the introduction of the Level System of our Deadly Awards, with students recognised for achieving Bronze, Silver, and Gold Levels. Our Gold level students were rewarded by a day trip to Dubbo for Infants, A Zoo Snooze experience for Primary and Jamberoo Action Park for Secondary. We should see more students achieve Gold next year.

They had fun and so did I, watching their funny interpretations and their learning about the literal and figurative meanings of idioms. 


TRANSITION YEAR 6 TO YEAR 7









































English with Mr Tierney

ENGLISH REPORT

In English this term, Stage 5 have been studying, "English and the language of Song".

Through the study of English and the language of song, students develop a deeper understanding of how language is used in a range of song lyrics to express emotions, attitudes, ideas and themes related to the human experience. They have responded to and composed texts to explore the relationship between the language forms and features used in poems and how these can be used imaginatively and powerfully in song lyrics.

Students have had the opportunity to use language imaginatively by studying song lyrics and attempting to compose their own, using literary techniques for a range of purposes. For example to recount stories, express personal emotions, protest, observe, reflect and speculate. Students also wrote anecdotes of personal song choices to develop a greater understanding and knowledge of the ways language can represent particular personal views and aspects of the world which influence us all. Our studies also extended to exploring how language and the use of visual images and music can evoke specific responses from an audience.

Through engaging in these learning opportunities, students developed their skills in comprehending and responding to texts, and develop their abilities to use language imaginatively, expressively and purposefully. Opportunities to plan, proof read and edit their work, helps students develop greater control of spelling, punctuation, syntax and grammar in a unique language setting.

This term Stage 4 have also studied a unit on, "Overcoming the Odds".

In this unit of work students were asked to consider the challenges and obstacles faced by groups and individuals worldwide. Students studied a range of texts which explore situations and experiences where people must find ways to overcome challenges of a physical, psychological, emotional and cultural nature. As a unit focus, our students were asked to nominate three types of challenges people face. Then explore how people have overcome such adversities to grow, recoup and thrive again. The lists students produced regarding challenges in their lives included; fears and phobias, judgement based on gender/sexuality, confusion/uncertainty, needing to feel accepted, familial/societal expectations, discrimination, culture/race/ethnicity, friendship/peer pressure and tragic events which challenge our perceptions of life and spirituality.

It is hoped our studies have prompted students to deeply consider how challenges and adversities shape our own sense of identity, emboldening against future trials. Also the inspiration we may take from others to strengthen our own resilience and fortitude.



Moorambilla also provides a meaningful opportunity to extend students leadership skills and widen their career options.


