### **STUDENT PHONES**

As we strive to maintain a focused and positive learning environment, we want to reiterate the statewide policy regarding the use of mobile phones within our school premises. It is imperative that all members of our school community are aware of and adhere to these guidelines.

Our school follows the Positive Behaviour for Learning (PBL) approach, engaging students from Kindergarten to Year 12 in structured lessons with staff each fortnight. Bi-weekly newsletters highlight the focus behaviour, and students have daily opportunities for recognition when demonstrating positive conduct. ### WEEK 6 STAGE 5 PBL LESSON

This week, our Stage 5 students delved into the crucial skill of following instructions, a fundamental aspect of both academic and real-world success.

As part of our lesson, students engaged in a thrilling activity called "Minefield." This immersive game challenged students to put their instruction-following skills to the test in a fun and interactive way. This involved students, blindfolded, navigating through an obstacle course strewn with "mines" (obstacles) while their teammates provided verbal instructions to guide them safely through the maze.

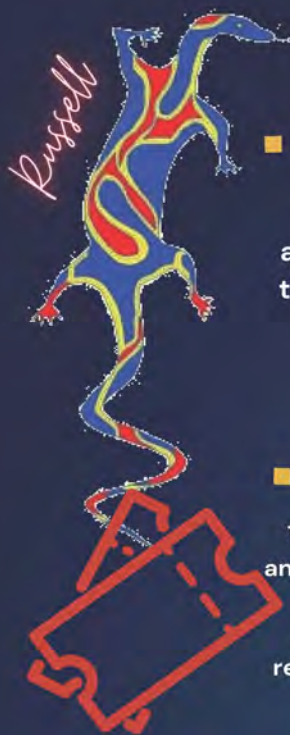

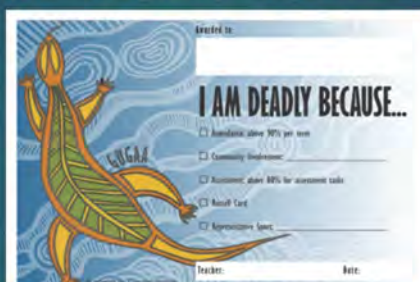
# Positive Behaviour For Learning

At Peak Hill Central School, we believe in providing a safe learning environment, where students are respectful of others, engaged in their learning, and strive to achieve their personal best. We provide all students with an opportunity to acquire the knowledge, skills and values to successfully continue their education, and to be respectful, responsible active citizens who serve, problem solve and positively contribute to the community.

## Fast and Frequent Russell Card

This reward system aims to encourage positive behaviours and actions through the use of 'fast and frequent' awards. Each student possesses a personalized card, which teachers sign when they observe positive behaviour. As students accumulate signatures, they are given the choice to redeem their full card for a coveted Deadly Award or participate in the tier system. The tiered rewards include a Deadly or a \$2.50 prize for one card, a \$5 prize for two cards, and a \$10 prize for three cards.

## Deadly Awards



This reward system aims to acknowledge students who are demonstrating deadly values. Our Deadly Awards are a separate award system that aims to encourage effort, achievement, and improvement for our students. Each week, every teacher will nominate students who have demonstrated the deadly values as outlined on the award. Awards are publicised in our newsletter and Facebook page. Student awards are accrued to earn rewards and acknowledge their efforts throughout the year.



## NAPLAN

National Assessment Program - Literacy and Numeracy  
Information for parents and carers

- All students in Years 3, 5, 7 and 9 in Australia do NAPLAN tests in March each year.
- NAPLAN tests students' skills in reading, writing and maths.
- The test questions are presented in Standard Australian English dialect.
- Students read some of the questions and listen to others with headphones.
- The tests will get easier or harder, depending on how students are going in the test.
- Students do four different tests. The names of the four tests are:



**Writing**



**Reading**



**Conventions of language**  
(spelling, grammar and punctuation)



**Numeracy**

- Students in Year 3 will do the Writing test using pencil and paper. Year 3 students will answer the other test questions on the computer.
- Students in Years 5, 7 and 9 will answer all their test questions on computers.
- Teachers will help students get ready for NAPLAN tests.
- Schools will get their students' results. The school will then give parents/carers a report showing their own child's results.
- Parents/carers can talk to the teacher about these results.
- NAPLAN shows how students are going all over Australia. People who work in the Australian Government, state and territory education authorities and schools use NAPLAN results. The results let them see which schools are doing well and which schools might need help.

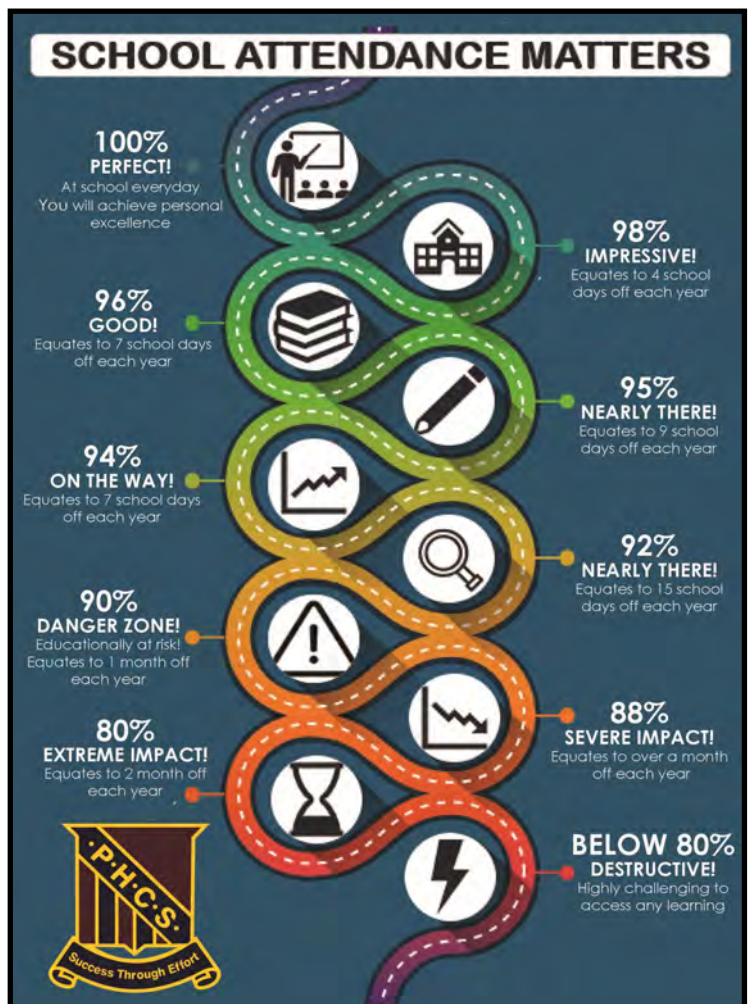

It has been another fantastic fortnight in K1! It is incredible to see how much progress each student has already made.

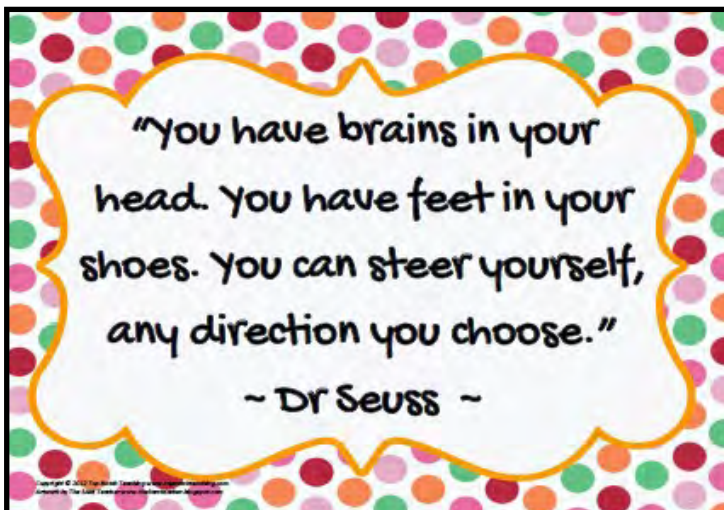
In Maths, we have been learning about repeating patterns and growing patterns. We have had so much fun exploring how to make them using different materials.

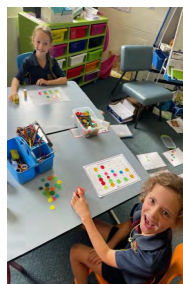

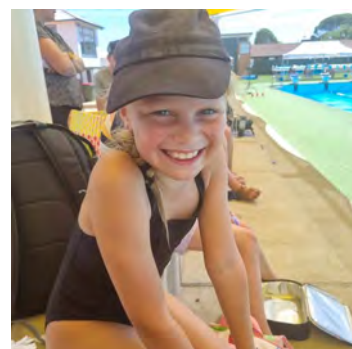
