Principal's Report

As Term 1 comes to an end I wish to congratulate all our students, teachers, support staff, parents and carers as well as the Peak Hill Community for all their hard work and support over this Term.

Recently I travelled to Sydney with our Agricultural Show Team for the second time with our team of PEAK Angora goats. Hard work and dedication from our students, Mr Horley, Mr Dunkley and staff who have accompanied the students. It is amazing that after 3 years of our breeding program we were crowned Most Successful School at this years Sydney Royal Easter Show, not only taking out school sections but also Open sections as well.

The school has received much media attention including WIN News, Parkes Champion Newspaper, ABC Radio and the Department of Education. Below is an extract by Sophie Lambert's reports for the NSW Department of Education.

"NO KIDDING ABOUT FOR THESE CHAMPION STUDENTS"

"Peak Hill Central School's Angora goats, raised and nurtured by students, are officially the top kids on the block, with the school recognised at the Royal Easter Show as the most successful in the prestigious competition.

Students travelled to Sydney from Peak Hill, 50 kilometres north of Parkes, with their silky-haired goats to go head-to-head with the finest goats the state has to offer.

Peak Hill Central School agriculture teacher Ken Horley said the school was "both shocked and immensely proud" of the students' results at the Royal Easter Show. The school was recognised as the 'Most Successful School', winning ribbons in both the schools' and open sections.

The awards included Grand Champion Junior (Animal Any Sex), Champion and Reserve Champion Junior (Open Class), Champion and Reserve Champion (Schools Exhibit) and Reserve Champion Kid (Open Class).

Mr Horley said the students were involved in all aspects of caring for the herd of 17 goats, from feeding to husbandry, prepping, shearing and washing the animals.

"Taking pride in our Angora goats gives the students something to care about and a reason to come to school," he said. "It teaches them about compassion, and the skills they acquire are transferrable to many different animal breeds."

ANZAC Day falls on the last Thursday of the school holidays. We encourage all students to attend and march with the school. Full summer school uniform and black shoes please. We are assembling at 10:30 am outside the school gates on Bogan street. All participants will receive a Deadly award for Community Participation. Deadly awards go towards achieving Bronze, Silver and Gold levels for our PBL rewards.

Term 2 learning recommences for all students on Tuesday 30 April. Have a safe and enjoyable holiday break.

Positive Behaviour For Learning

At Peak Hill Central School, we believe in providing a safe learning environment, where students are respectful of others, engaged in their learning, and strive to achieve their personal best. We provide all students with an opportunity to acquire the knowledge, skills and values to successfully continue their education, and to be respectful, responsible active citizens who serve, problem solve and positively contribute to the community.

Fast and Frequent Russell Card

This reward system aims to encourage positive behaviours and actions through the use of 'fast and frequent' awards. Each student possesses a personalized card, which teachers sign when they observe positive behaviour. As students accumulate signatures, they are given the choice to redeem their full card for a coveted Deadly Award or participate in the tier system. The tiered rewards include a Deadly or a \$2.50 prize for one card, a \$5 prize for two cards, and a \$10 prize for three cards.

Deadly Awards



This reward system aims to acknowledge students who are demonstrating deadly values. Our Deadly Awards are a separate award system that aims to encourage effort, achievement, and improvement for our students. Each week, every teacher will nominate students who have demonstrated the deadly values as outlined on the award. Awards are publicised in our newsletter and Facebook page. Student awards are accrued to earn rewards and acknowledge their efforts throughout the year.

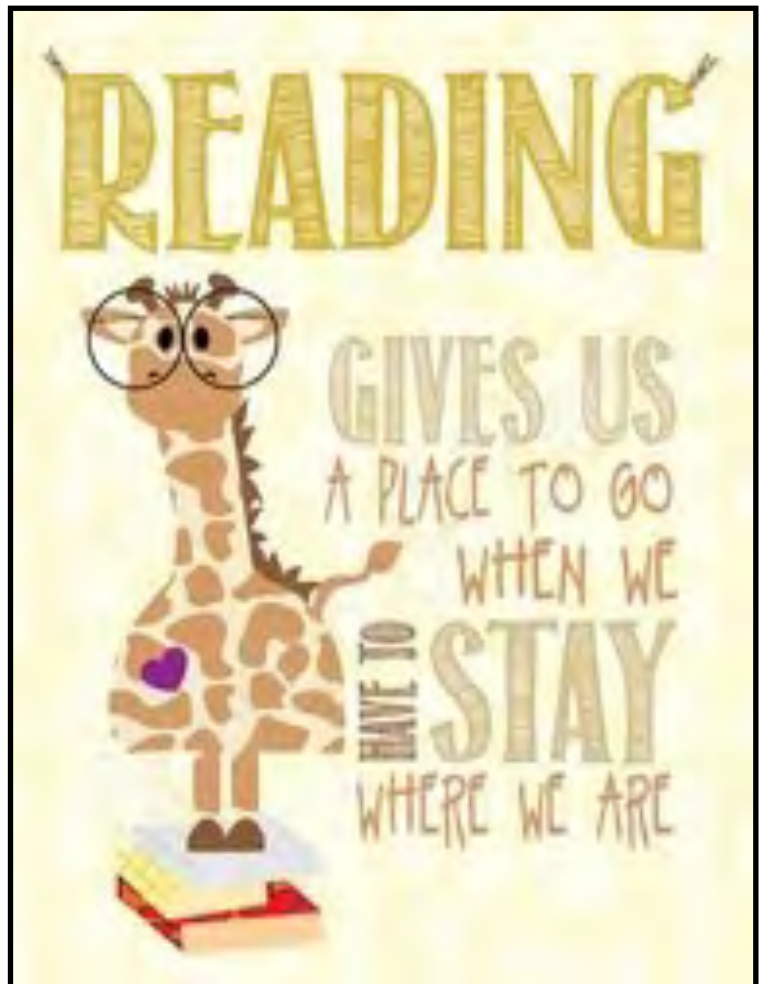

National Simultaneous Storytime

NATIONAL SIMULTANEOUS STORYTIME

National Simultaneous Storytime is a great way to celebrate reading and literacy.

For young people, it helps to foster an early love of reading and develop literacy skills. It also provides an opportunity for children to come together and share their love of books with one another.

National Simultaneous Storytime takes place annually on the fourth Wednesday of May. This year, it will be held on May 22nd, 2024 at 12pm. The event is organised by the Australian Library and Information Association (ALIA)

During National Simultaneous Storytime, people come together to read the same story at the same time. This creates a powerful sense of community around reading and supports the development of a lifelong love of reading in young people.

First launched in Australia in 1997 National Simultaneous Storytime was created in response to a decline in library usage and the need to promote literacy among young people. Since then, the event has grown in popularity and is now celebrated in over 5,000 libraries and more than 4,000 schools across Australia and New Zealand. At PHCS, all primary classes will join thousands of other school students online as we read together.

In Maths, we have practised reading and writing numbers, measuring length and area, cutting shapes in half, continuing patterns, and reading dice dots. We have had lots of fun

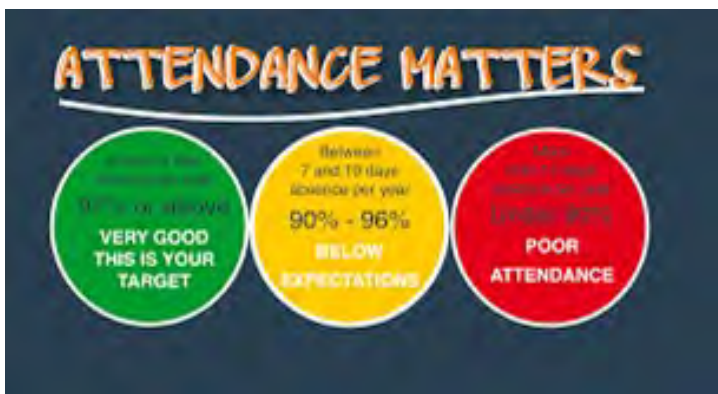

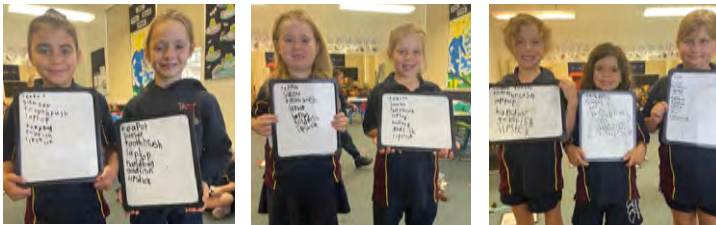

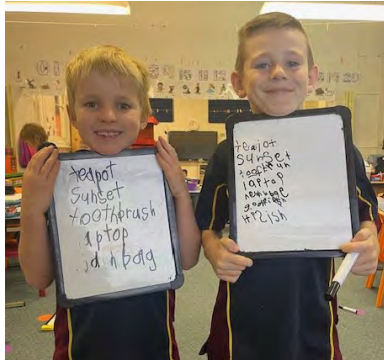
During Activate Clay, students glazed their turtles and pinch pots ready for firing so that they can take them home for the school holidays.

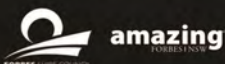
